American Arborvitae – Broad-based, upright, conical to pyramidal shaped often single-trunked, evergreen tree. Green, scale-like foliage in flat sprays that does not yellow in the winter. Great for windbreaks, screening, and tall hedges. Grows 25-40 feet high by 10-15 feet wide in sun to



Balsam Fir - A Native, It is celebrated for its rich green needles, natural conical shape, and fragrance. A slow grower- can reach 45-75' high x 20-25 wide.



Black Spruce - a small, narrow evergreen tree with a spire-like crown. It has descending branches, with dark, bluish-green needles, and upturned ends. Lower limbs sweep the ground. It is an excellent choice for cold northern climates and grows 30 -50' high x 20 to 30' wide.



Canadian Hemlock - Short, soft light yellow green needles in spring changing to glossy dark green. Likes moist, organic well-drained soils. Tolerates shade well. Does not tolerate drought and wind.



Norway Spruce – A graceful pyramidal with shiny, dark green needles. Beautiful spreading branches with drooping twigs. An extremely hardy tree that grows in most soil conditions. Makes a charming Christmas tree, an appealing ornament specimen, or a protective windbreak. Fast growth makes this spruce ideal for timber.



American Redbud – A small flat-topped tree, producing pink blooms on bare stems in early spring. Foliage is large and heart shaped, changing to yellow in the fall. Does well in protected location.



Elderberry – Great for jellies, syrups, pies, wines, and brandies. Native to eastern North America. It is a deciduous, somewhat sprawling, suckering shrub that typically grows to 5-12' tall. It typically occurs on streambanks, moist woodlands, thickets, fence rows and roadsides. Prefers medium to wet, well-drained soils in full sun to part shade but tolerates a wide range of soils. Spreads by



Dwarf Mugo Pine (Pumilio) also known as Swiss mountain pine, is a broad-spreading pine shrub commonly used in landscape gardening. 'Pumilio' is a dwarf form with a dense, spreading habit. It often grows prostrate with upright branching. It typically matures over time to 3-5' tall by 6-10' wide.



Scotch Pine – Scotch pine is conical to columnar when young, developing an open-rounded, irregular crown as it matures and growing 30-



Aronia Berry (Black Chokeberry) – Aronia berries are the newest 'superfruit' with high quantities of antioxidants and more polyphenols than blueberries. Native to North America, this shrub does well in full sun or along wooded borders. Berries are a bit astringent so



Kousa Dogwood - A small, deciduous flowering tree or multi-stemmed shrub that typically grows 15-30' tall and wide, with a vase-shaped habit in the early years but eventually maturing to a more rounded form. Bloom occurs in late spring in full sun or part shade. Fruit is edible.



Persian Lilac - a graceful arching *flowering shrub* reaching to 4-8' feet tall x 5-10' wide. The pale violet to lavender flowers of the Persian Lilac are wonderfully fragrant. The 2 to 3 inch long blooms appear in late spring and bloom abundantly into early summer, *attracting bees*,



Red Twig Dogwood- is an upright-spreading, suckering shrub that typically grows to 6-9' tall with a slightly larger spread. Thrives in wet swampy areas, wetland margins or along lakes and rivers. Leaves turn red to orange in autumn. Reddish stems turn bright red in winter and are particularly showy against a snowy backdrop. Tiny, fragrant, white flowers give



Serviceberry - Large shrubs or single- or multi-stemmed small trees. They are used as specimen and key plants in landscapes as well as in group plantings as borders, backdrops and screens. Serviceberry provides year-round interest in white spring flowers, yellow to red fall foliage, smooth gray bark, and edible purple fruit.



Shagbark Hickory - This Midwest native is named for its bark, which peels away in large, flat, curving plates, giving the tree a shaggy appearance. As a member of the walnut family, the hickory produces edible nuts. Can grow 60-



Whitespire Birch- Whitespire is best known for its upright form, non-exfoliating white bark, dark green leaves and attractive yellow fall color. It grows 20-40' high x 10-20' wide in full to part sun. Birch prefers medium to wet soils.



Everbearing Strawberry Plants- Strawberries are one of the easiest fruits for the home gardener to grow and one of the most rewarding. This perennial blooms spring and summer prior to bearing fruit. Will produce large juicy berries throughout the



Sweetgum- Sweet-gum is known for its unique star-shaped leaves with outstanding yellow, red, and purple fall color. It can be an excellent shade tree in the right location, away from foot traffic where the spiky "gumball" fruits will not be an annoyance. Can grow 60 - 75' high x 40 - 75 wide. Prefers full sun.



Asparagus- Unlike most vegetables, asparagus plants are perennial, which means the same plants grow in your garden year after year. The spears that we enjoy as a vegetable are the new shoots that emerge in spring. Delicious steamed or roasted. Comes bare-root.



Herb Garden - Eight Culinary and Healthful herbs in a decorative petal shaped planter. Includes Basil, Parsley, Chives, Cilantro/Coriander, Lavender, Spearmint, Chamomile, Lemon Balm. All plants
